Spring Leaf & Limb Recycling Pick Up: April 1<sup>st</sup> – May 7<sup>th</sup>. Leaves must be raked to the curb in a windrow (long line) no further than 6 feet from road's edge, NO BAGGED LEAVES, NO GRASS CLIPPINGS! DO NOT place any trash, branches, stones, dirt or debris in the windrow. Please have a minimum of 6 feet between leaves and branches placed at curb. Leaves and limbs may be placed curbside starting April 1. The last day to place them at the curb is May 7, with nothing placed curbside until pickup is schedule in the Fall.

largest portion, followed by Municipal at 22% and County at 20%. So, savings in our school taxes must always be given serious consideration. The feasibility study was just the first of many steps necessary before any change can be made, with the last step being a referendum, by you, the voters. The full study can be found on the Pittsgrove Township Board of Education website. pittsgrove.net, and comments may be made at comment@pittsgrove.net. Additionally, Newfield along with the Delsea, Franklin and Elk Boards of Education are currently awaiting funding from the DCA to test the feasibility of staying in a regionalized Delsea Regional school district, which would have the added benefit of keeping our children where they are. We are closely monitoring the progress of the Delsea Regional DCA funding with our goal of making sure our residents have all the information they need to make an informed decision. ### NEWFIELD RECYCLING INFORMATION

The Borough is being charged an extra fee weekly because of plastic bags in our recycling carts" **PLEASE BE VIGILANT!** There should be **NO** plastic bags, i.e., trash bags, single use bags, etc. in your recycling carts! Please place clean, dry cardboard at the curb on recycle days only! Please remove all packaging materials, i.e., styrofoam, peanuts, airbags, etc. from any cardboard being recycled. The packaging materials are not recyclable and should be disposed of with the trash.

#### RECYCLE CARTS ONLY ACCEPTABLE MATERIALS

Newspaper and Paper, Cardboard (no wax), Plastic Bottles labeled #1 and #2 on the bottom, Glass Bottles and Jars of any color, Aluminum and Tin Cans.

#### NON ACCEPTABLE MATERIALS

Appliances, PLASTIC BAGS, Batteries, Food Scraps, Medical Waste, Diapers, Human Waste, Clothing, Needles & Syringes, Ceramics, Porcelain, Cookware, Coat Hangers, Mixed Rigid Plastic, Electronics, Windows or Plate Glass, Mirrors, Lawn Chairs and Tables, Tires and Rims, Propane Tanks, Mattresses, Pizza Boxes, Plastic Bottle Caps.

If you have received a Warning Sticker or Door Hanger for incorrect trash or recycling, it is important for you to contact Public Works at 856-697-4332 so we can work together to rectify the problem. **ATTENTION LANDLORDS:** Please forward all information you receive regarding Borough trash and recycling pickup to your tenants. It is the tenant's responsibility to follow trash and recycling laws, but they need to be informed. **ATTENTION TENANTS:** If you need help receiving info on trash or recycling pickup, please contact us at 856-697-4332 and we will be glad to help! Please remember there should be NO PROPANE TANKS of any size placed in the trash or recycle bins. Please be vigilant!

## NEWFIELD RECYCLING INFORMATION

All Trash and Recycling carts must be placed curbside by 6:30 am the day of scheduled pickup: Wednesday for Trash and Friday for Recycling, and should be removed the same day.

Additional details are noted in the Borough's Property Maintenance Code 307.4 Storage and Placement for Collection.

A. Storage. All receptacles containing rubbish or garbage which are not being placed for collection or disposal shall be stored in such a manner as to minimize the potential negative impact upon the adjoining property owners, reasonably inconspicuous from adjacent streets. Receptacles should be stored indoors, in sheltered storage areas or, if kept outdoors, receptacles should be stored at the rear of each private dwelling not closer than 15 feet from the boundary of the property or located in such other place as the owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or agent of the premises may be reasonably certain that the receptacles will not interfere with the health, safety, and welfare of an adjoining owner.

**B.** Placement. No containers shall be placed for collection prior to sunset of the evening before the scheduled collection day, nor shall containers remain at the roadside later than 9:00 pm the day they are collected. Also, please remember we do not pick up any bulk items in the trash cart or curbside. There should not be any yard waste, i.e., grass clippings, twigs and leaves placed in the trash or recycling carts.

# WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH WASHING YOUR CAR?

Washing your car on a paved surface can allow the soapy wash water and other pollutants, like oil and grease, to run off into a storm drain. Most soap contains phosphates and other chemicals that, in large amounts can contaminate your drinking water, as well as kill fish, wildlife and plants. The soap, together with the dirt and oil washed from your car, flows into nearby storm drains, which flows directly into lakes, rivers and the ocean. The phosphates from the soap can cause excess algae to grow, which can be harmful to the water quality.

### YOU CAN HELP!

- Take your car to a car washing facility, rather than washing it yourself. Commercial car washes treat and recycle the water.
- If you can't get to a car washing facility, wash your car on an unpaved surface and use biodegradable soap.
- Organize a Car Wash Fundraiser for a local organization. Visit **www.cleanwaterNJ.org** to learn how.

### WHY SHOULD YOU CARE ABOUT CLEAN WATER?

Stormwater pollution is one of the greatest threats to New Jersey's clean water supply. Clean water provides access to safe drinking water, places for recreation, commercial opportunities, healthy wildlife habitats, and adds beauty to our landscape. Rain washes pollution from streets, parking lots, and lawns into storm drains, then directly to our streams, rivers, lakes and oceans.

Did you know more than 60 percent of water pollution comes from things like motor oil, fertilizers, pet waste, and detergents? By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater.
